EAC's Chartering Legislation - Help America Vote Act (HAVA)

- HAVA enacted by the United States Congress to make sweeping reforms to the nation's voting process.
- HAVA addresses improvements to voting systems and voter access that were identified following the contested 2000 presidential election.
- HAVA creates new mandatory minimum standards for states to follow in several key areas of election administration.
- HAVA Provides Funding to Help States
 - Meet The New Standards
 - Replace Voting Systems
 - Improve Election Administration





U.S. Election Assistance Commission (EAC)

- Established by the Help America Vote Act (HAVA)
 - Signed into law by President George W. Bush, Oct. 29, 2002
 - EAC opened its doors on April 5, 2004
- Independent, Bipartisan Commission
- Consists of Four commissioners
 - Two commissioners from each political party
 - Presidential appointees that are approved by the senate
 - First four commissioners sworn into office on Dec. 13, 2003





U.S. Election Assistance Commission

Leadership

- Nominated by the President and Confirmed by the U.S. Senate
- •Current Commissioners sworn into office Jan 13, 2015
 - Thomas Hicks, Chairman
 - Matthew Masterson, Vice-Chairman -

HAVA & EAC

HAVA Established EAC to:

- •Distribute HAVA Funds to States for New Voting Equipment
- Create Voluntary Voting System Guidelines (VVSG)
- Operate a voting system testing and certification program
- •Research and develop guidance to meet HAVA requirements
- Assist the states regarding HAVA compliance
- •Maintain the National Mail Voter Registration Form
- Administer a National Clearinghouse on Election Administration
 - Shared Best Practices
 - Information for Voters
 - Other Resources to Improve Elections



Military & Overseas Voters – The Law

Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA)

- •Act provides the legal framework which ensures that military and overseas voters can vote.
- •U.S. citizens covered by UOCAVA are
 - Active members of the Uniformed Services
 - •The Merchant Marine
 - •The commissioned corps of the Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
 - The above's eligible family members and
 - •U.S. citizens residing outside the United States





Military & Overseas Voters – The Law

HAVA-EAC-UOCAVA Interactions

- single state office to provide information on registration and absentee ballots.
- Report on absentee ballots transmitted and received after general elections
- Extension of period covered by single absentee ballot application
- Prohibition of refusal of voter registration and absentee ballot for early submission





Military & Overseas Voters – The Law

The Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act (MOVE)

- •This amended *UOCAVA* and other statutes by providing greater protections for:
 - Service Members,
 - •Eligible family members of service members
 - and other overseas citizens
- •Two Important Provisions:
 - •MOVE Act requires States to send absentee ballots to *UOCAVA* voters at least 45 days before federal elections.
 - •Allows UOCAVA voters to submit their ballots electronically

Working Together – Policy Working Group

Voter Communication

- •Use plain language
- •Make effective user-friendly ballot return envelopes
- Communicate to voters when the ballot application is accepted
- •Provide information to voters about what is on the ballot



- •Treat the FCPA as a permanent request for voter registration
- •Establish a default validity period for the FPCA mail ballot request

Online Voter Registration

•States that provide online voter registration should incorporate online registration for overseas and military voters

Improved Engagement with U.S. Military Community

•Establish partnerships between state and local election officials and local military installations

- \$3.2 million initiative to improve the return rate of overseas absentee ballots
- Partnering with FVAP and working within two working groups on best practices and successful programs.

- •Look to transactional election data for voter success metrics








Election Administration Voting Survey









For Helping UOCAVA Voters and their Families

The U.S. Election Assistance Commission (EAC) collaborated with the U.S. Department of Defense's Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) to develop these tips for working with Service members, their families and citizens residing overseas.

Service members, their families and overseas citizens face unique challenges in registering to vote and in requesting, receiving and returning their ballots. These six tips can help you more efficiently navigate the process for this special group of absentee voters.



Use technology to stay in touch. Many UOCAVA voters have multiple email addresses you can use to notify them of their registration status, the receipt of their voted ballot and to let them know whether or not their ballot was accepted or rejected.

60 days prior to an election, consider emailing/mailing a notice of election to all UCANA voters every election in order to confirm their current email/mailing address. Hermember this is a group of people who move frequently.

Keep information on your website current and be sure to:

 Publish your election year calendars with clearly marked deadlines for registration, ballot requests and ballot return.

REMEMBER

Provide a generic email address for UDCAVA voters to contact your office (e.g., UOCAVAvoters@county.gov), so the address remains the same even with election stiff turnover. This practice allows multiple staff members to have access to the account.


